Previously, she worked on the books desk at The Times, and still works as a freelance journalist because, as she always says, three jobs are better than one. Jennifer works as a strategy director in a creative agency, which is either the opposite of being a fortune teller, or the exact same thing, depending on who you ask.

Like many people, the pair first discovered tarot in their teens. Many years later they decided to return to it and to learn more about the practice of tarot reading. They trained at Treadwell's in London, one of the UK's oldest and most respected occult establishments, before setting up Litwitchure in 2018. Since then, they have appeared at festivals throughout the UK with interviewees including Pulp's Jarvis Cocker, Nina Stibbe, author of Love, Nina, Emma Jane Unsworth, author of Adults and Animals, and many more.

Fans aims to take the reader on a journey through a constellation of fandoms and, along the way, demonstrates some fundamental truths about the human condition. Part behavioural study, part entertainment, at its heart the book would be a story of collectives, of what happens to us when we interact with people who share our passions. The human brain is wired to reach out, and while our groupish tendencies can bring much strife (religious intolerance, racism, war etc), they are also the source of some of our greatest satisfactions.

Fandoms offer much of the pleasure of tribalism with little of the harm: a feeling of belonging and of shared culture, a sense of meaning and purpose, improved mental well-being, reassurance that your most outlandish convictions will be taken seriously, and the freedom to try to emulate (and dress like) your hero. Bond explores the subject through the lens of social identity theory, a set of ideas used by social psychologists and anthropologists to understand how people behave in groups and why groups have such a profound effect on human culture.

In Nostalgia: A Biography, Agnes Arnold-Forster blends neuroscience and psychology with the history of medicine and the emotions to explore the evolution of nostalgia from its first identification in the seventeenth century (when it was held to be an illness which could, quite literally, kill you) to the present day (when it is co-opted by advertising agencies and politicians alike to sell us good and policies). It is a social and political emotion, vulnerable to misuse, and one that reflects the anxieties of the age. Arnold-Forster's will be the first history of this complex, slippery emotion to be aimed at a general reader.

Nostalgia: A Biography is much more than a compendium of quirky tales. Instead, it uses one emotion as a lens to consider the history of medicine, the changing pace of society, our collective feelings of regret, dislocation, and belonging, the conditions of modern and contemporary work, and the politics of fear and anxiety. Expressions of nostalgia are one way we communicate a desire for the past, dissatisfaction about the present, and our visions for the future. In this way, this is not just a history, but an analysis of what we are doing now, how we feel about it, and what we might want to change about the world in which we live.

Dr Arnold-Forster is a 30-year-old cultural historian of modern British health, gender, emotions, and work. She has a PhD from King's College London and her first academic book, The Cancer Problem, was published earlier this year by Oxford University Press. She has written widely for the academic, medical, and mainstream press (including for The Times and the Independent), appeared on BBC Radio, and worked with the Science Museum, the Wellcome Collection, and the Royal College of Nursing on public engagement projects, exhibitions, and events. She is the sister of Supreme Leader Kim Jong-un and, as head of propaganda, is the most powerful woman in North Korea's history. She is also the chief internal administrator and foreign policymaker, known for both charming and insulting foreign leaders. An enthusiastic proponent of a murderous regime, she was brought up to believe it is her job to reunite the north and south, or die trying. She's pretty, she seems demure, and she's incredibly dangerous . . .

The Sister is a fascinating, authoritative account of the secretive world of North Korea and its ruling dynasty – a family with an iron grip on power who torture and starve its people into submission, who kill dissenters, and who use theft and assassination as tools of statecraft.

Sung-Yoon Lee is a scholar of Korean and East Asian studies and a specialist on North Korea. He is the Kim Koo-Korea Foundation Professor in Korean Studies and Assistant Professor at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University. He was an Associate in Research at the Korea Institute, Harvard University, and a Research Fellow at the National Asia Research Program. Lee has provided advice to the US government and is an outspoken proponent of several policies aimed at changing the North Korean regime towards a path of denuclearization and improvement of human rights, while keeping the peace and stability in Northeast Asia.

Set in contemporary Britain, Not Alone tells the story of Katie and Harry, a mother and son who are fighting for survival in a world devastated by a toxic storm.

Not Alone follows Katie and her son Harry, who have survived alone in their haven of a flat for the last five years. Katie is a character with a quiet strength; a woman who has had to rely on herself to survive and care for her young son, alone in a world that has been ravaged by a toxic storm brought on by the climate crisis and microplastic pollution. As she forages for what is safe to eat, Harry remains in the flat, quiet and safe from the dangers of outside: pervasive layers of toxic dust on the ground from the storm and subsequent rains, plastic smog, hungry animals, and fear of not being as alone and safe as Katie hopes they are. Life is a relentless cycle of fear, hunger and a longing for the man Katie was meant to marry: Jack, who left for work on the day of the storm, and is since presumed dead.

Lily had promised herself that if she survived Auschwitz she would tell everyone the truth about the camp. Now was her chance.

In Lily's Promise she writes movingly about her happy childhood in Hungary, the death of her mother and two youngest siblings on their arrival at Auschwitz in 1944 and her determination to keep her two other sisters safe. She describes the inhumanity of the camp and the small acts of defiance that gave her strength. From there she and her sisters became slave labour in a munitions factory, and then faced a death march that they barely survived.

Lily lost so much, but she built a new life for herself and her family, first in Israel and then in London. It wasn't easy; the pain of her past was always with her, but this extraordinary woman found the strength to speak out in the hope that such evil would never happen again.
