Child of Our Time: Turning 20

Helena:

People did not think I was going to live to this age.

I was an IVF baby. I was born premature.

I was a triplet - one was named Barry and one was named Millie and they, both of them did not survive. But I did.

Dad:

You didn't know when the phone was going to go and say your child's dying. It was like that, that's how near it was and you were warned about this. You know, we don't know the hour, the moment or the day when something's going to go right or wrong.

Mum:

You spend hours and hours looking at your little baby and willing them to survive.

Dad:

They said, right, you know, your daughter's really ill; chances are she's going to be seriously handicapped; she'll never be right.

Mum:

Two days later they're asking to turn her life support off and my overwhelming memory is, why did I bury Millie and little Barry when Helena's gonna die?

Helena:

But my mum has told me this and she said um, "I was going to and then you like, you had your eyes open and you were looking at me." She said, "You can't kill someone that's looking at you." So here I am today.

I think they were just happy I was like, alive to have a future.

But here I am age 19. I'm fine!

Dad:

Just for safety's sake, we'll put it on.

Mum:

You can jump up as high as you want in there. All the way round.

Dad:

You can't fall off because it's all the way round and you'll only fall into it.

Mum:

Look, it's all the way round.

I think that Helena is very cautious because we probably wrapped her up in cotton wool when she was little.

People call Helena the Health and Safety Officer, she's a ultra-safe girl. I mean she goes on a plane, she reads the information about whether or not planes...safety stuff and then she practices the brace position.

Helena:

Dad:

Mum:
