Working as an urban driver

Urban drivers operate fixed axle vehicles over 3500kg in weight, often serving multiple customers each day in congested areas. Urban drivers work in a variety of business areas that depend on the delivery and collection of goods by road. They typically work in a specified part of the country and their work pattern is normally time-critical.

The broad purpose of the occupation is to transport goods by road to an agreed destination, quality and time standard. They must ensure the vehicle is loaded correctly, making adjustments as volumes change. They are also responsible for adapting their driving style, taking account of fuel efficiency, the local environment and their vehicles strengths and limitations.



The programme's structure

Apprentices will be placed in a role over 12 months during which they will be supported while onprogramme by their tutor. The tutor will review the progress of the apprentice against the standard to ensure they are prepared for the end-point assessment.

Multiple-choice test

45-minute interview led by an independent assessor covering topics that may be difficult to see as part of a practical assessment
