

Movement around the pitch


Moving into the best position to make and sell decisions





Aim: To keep ahead of the attack as play moves toward you

This will help you make accurate decisions



Start moving immediately on a turnover

Move quickly and directly to your 23 as play crosses the halfway line


Move back into your 'D' as play enters your 23

Direction of play



Being in the Right Place

- Primary Aim
 - Make the correct decision
 - Sell decisions
 - Provide right support to your colleague
- Most Important area In the "D"






Aim: Ensure you have an angle when looking at play

This will help you to see as much as possible with a clear view

When play is on your sideline:

- 1. Stay inside the pitch, or consider moving over the sideline to obtain an angle
- 2. do not get caught square to the players, or looking through players



A 45° body angle to play and open shoulders gives a clearer view. It enables you to scan to see players behind you and move earlier






Aim: be close to the action and adjust based on the play

'D' positioning and repositioning is key to making accurate decisions

Head for your near post when play is on the far side but if near the back line pull out to get the angle and a clear view






If the goalkeeper comes off their line or goes to ground, move up off the back line so you can have a clear view of the ball



Aim: Keep up with play moving away from you

This will help you make accurate decisions and support your colleague



Follow play quickly out of your 'D' and '23'

Keep close to play when it is on your side, approx 1/4 pitch

If play is on the far side, move infield to keep proximity to play and you colleague

Direction of play



ORTH WEST Aim: Ensure you have an angle when looking at play



The umpire is well positioned to have an angle on the sideline hit and at the same time be well placed for when the ball enters the 'D'



Decisions

There are 3 elements to your decisions

- > Technical (the decision you give)
 - What did you actually see? Positioning is key!
- > Management (the penalty you give)
 - Have you identified a breakdown of play? Is it more than just a free hit?
- > Communication (how you speak & what you say)
 - Have you helped the players to understand? This helps to manage the game!



Key considerations when making decisions

What you should consider when watching the play

- 1. Has there been an offence, and if so by who?
- 2. Do I need to blow my whistle or can allow play on?
- 3. If there has been an offence, do I need to do something?
