EHO Officiating Guidance

2025/2026 Season

Umpires are to start Penalty Corners on their whistle not their voice

For greater consistency across the sport, and to deliver a clearer message to all involved in the game, the new guidance for umpires at all levels in England is to start Penalty Corners on a whistle not voice (e.g. no longer shouting "play" or "when you're ready" for the injection to take place).

As per tournament regulations for the National and 8 Area Adult Leagues, time will not be stopped for the setup of the Penalty Corner, unless there is an injury, card or other situation that requires time to be stopped. This will also apply to most other competitions, but there may be some variations in specific tournament regulations (e.g. Talent Academy Cup). It is therefore, important for umpires to check the tournament regulations for any amendments to the FIH Rules of Hockey.

From the 2025/2026 season:

- Umpires will blow their whistle to award the Penalty Corner.
- ▶ Allow the players enough time to put on their extra protective equipment and set up for the corner.
- Umpires will then blow their whistle to indicate for the Penalty Corner to start.
- The injector should play the ball within a couple of seconds of the whistle being blown and not delay too long.

PENALTIES GUIDANG



Umpires should always communicate with the players to manage the game, including initially giving clear warnings to low level offenders — WHISTLE TONE, SIGNALS, VOICE.

Consider the following in relation to the offence within the context of the game: REPETITION, INTENT (deliberate), IMPACT (consequence), PHYSICALITY, DANGER, VIOLENCE.

Make clear if an escalation of the penalty applies to the player, their team or both teams - to show you are moving through the control ladder as appropriate.

2 MIN GREEN CARD

- . LOW IMPACT
- . NO PHYSICALITY
- NO DANGER
- FIRST REPETITION AFTER INITIAL CLEAR VOCAL WARNING
- LOW LEVEL DISSENT


5 MIN YELLOW CARD

- · HIGH IMPACT
- REPEAT OF OFFENDING FOR WHICH GREEN CARD ALREADY AWARDED
- INTENTIONAL OFFENDING
- · PHYSICALITY
- · DANGER
- STRONG DISSENT

10 MIN YELLOW CARD

- HIGH IMPACT AND DELIBERATE AND/OR PHYSICALITY AND/OR DANGER
- GOING TO GROUND AND CAUSING OPPONENT TO GO TO GROUND OR TAKE EVASIVE ACTION
- EXTENSION TO 5 MIN YC E.G. FOR DISSENT FOLLOWING AWARD OF YC

RED CARD OR MMO



- ABUSE OF ANY PARTICIPANT USING FOUL LANGUAGE OR INVOLVING PROTECTED CHARACTERISTICS (RACE, RELIGION, ORIENTATION ETC)
- . ACCUSATIONS OF BIAS OR CHEATING BY AN OFFICIAL
- 2ND YC FOR SAME OFFENCE PROVIDING NOT DISSENT OR VIOLENCE (FOR WHICH STRAIGHT RED)
